

**BUDGET DEBATE ON THE DEPARTMENT OF  
AGRICULTURE, CONSERVATION, ENVIRONMENT AND  
RURAL DEVELOPMENT**

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This is one department that has been allocated a very big chunk of the budget. This department is charged primarily with ensuring food security for citizens in the province.

The scarce financial resources allocated to the department should be put to good use; we should see farmers being trained and assisted to grow into self sufficient producers of food.

There are many agricultural buildings that are turning into ruins because they are not being utilised optimally. A look at some at Makoshong in the Moses Kotane Municipality and the dilapidated ones at Ga-Mmatau in the same municipality are clear evidence that agriculture in the North West is slowly but surely consigned to death.

The over zealous political upstarts that took control of the province in 1994 in their absurd rush to obliterate anything that was done by Kgosi Mangope's government closed down the Taung College of Agriculture and other institutions to the detriment of the people in the province. This is a clear demonstration of cutting one's nose to spite one's face. They need the facilities now.

We note the half hearted and muted pronouncements to have these institutions reopened and we say it is a hard lesson that politicians have to learn to take care of what they have. Reopening the college and all other institutions for that matter that were closed down consciously by the ANC government is not going to be as easy as it was when they were closed down. This is a fact we have to live with.

Rural Development is such a noble idea but will be some time before it takes root because of financial and bureaucratic logjams. We look forward to it. We hope it will not be turned at looking at developing rural towns to the neglect of villages out there.
