## SPEECH BY THE PRESIDENT

The building of RDP and low cost houses must be a well planned process by qualified Mafikeng Local Municipality is one of the five municipalities that fall under Ngaka Modiri Molema Municipality. It has 31 wards, 102 villages and surbubs. The total area of the Municipality is 3 703km². This research was conducted by stats SA 2007 and the population of the Municipality is estimated at 290 228 people. Besides the support and intervensions made by the North West Provincial Government, the MLM was previously(2003/2004 financial year) under intervension in terms of section 139 (1)(b) of the constitution relating to the matters of poor governance, financial management, administration and service delivery.

In 1996, the retail supply of electricity and gas was assigned to MLM, however the licence agreements were withdrawn and handed to Eskom. Some of the powers and functions which were allocated to MLM, in 2000 were shifted to the District municipality in 2003. These included the provision of potable water supply, domestic waste-water and sewage disposal. the municipal health services were shifted to the District municipality in 2004. A further shift occued in 2005 when the roads function was moved to the district municipality.

Financial challenges that are facing the municipality are:

- ➤ Revenue collection for services rendered and property rates levied are extremely low.
- ➤ Need to address significant amount of outstanding consumer debts.
- ➤ Significant under-provision for bad or irrecoverable debts
- > Grants for capital expenditure being used to fund operating expenditure.
- ➤ Adopted budget for 2010/2011 is structurally imbalanced.
- ➤ Salaries and administrative costs are extremely high.
- ➤ 2008-2009-11,7 million negetive net cash in financial year
- ➤ 2009-2010- 60.9 million negetive net cash in financial year

The state of roads in Mahikeng are intollerable, potholes are every where. One needs a PHD to drive around (potholes doging skills). Refuse removal remains a challenge in this municipality, the question is if we have general workers who are being paid to do this why aren't they doing their work, and what is the municipality doing about this? These very same people are drawing salaries from the municipality every month.

There are villages like Ramosadi and Seweding that are plaqued by high levels of crime such as; cable theft, house breaking and rape. If in the IDP document of Mahikeng installation of high mass lights was prioritised we wouldn't be addressing this issue. There is also money that is transferred from the Department of Transport, Roads and Community Safety, that is aimed at addressing crime prevention project in Mahikeng. The money has been allocated to the CPF( Community Police Forum) of Mahikeng. Our challenge in Mahikeng is accountability.

Should we gain control of this troubled municipality we shall:

- Empower local citizens and allow them to participate in the planning and implementation of development policies.
- ➤ We aim at ending the top-down governance and really give an ear to what people want.

- ➤ We shall build the capacity of those elected in positions.
- ➤ Development funding must go directly to local government and avoid creation people and not just comrades and cronnies. We'd like our people to have beautiful planned houses and not the ugly shapless things that the ANC has insulted us with
